




Varjak Paw by SF Said

Varjak Paw is a Mesopotamian Blue kitten, who lives high up in an old house on a hill. He's never left home, until he receives a mysterious visit from his grandfather who tells him about The Way - a secret martial art for cats. Murder Most Unladylike by Robin Stevens




Time Travelling with a Hamster by Ross Welford


This deliciously creepy, gripping novel is packed with glorious illustrations by Chris Riddell, and is guaranteed to delight and entrance readers of all ages.


A Monster Calls by Patrick Ness

Wolf Brother by Michelle Paver



But then someone new enters his world and changes it for ever.
